

Notre Dame Football Coach and Wife Honored at Arc Tribute Event

Did You Know?

The term 'mental retardation' is being used less and less frequently by organizations that serve or represent people with cognitive disabilities. In fact, AAMR, the American Association on Mental Retardation, changed their name this past year to the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (AAIDD). This change represents a new standard in disability terminology and provides a more socially acceptable way of speaking or writing about people with intellectual disabilities.



The Arc of Atlantic County's third annual tribute to individuals who improve the lives of people with intellectual or developmental disabilities was held on Sunday, March 18, 2007 at The Carriage House in Galloway, NJ and raised more than \$137,000 for The Arc's programs and services--truly a record-breaking event! Over 300 guests attended this much-anticipated luncheon and silent auction that paid tribute to the nationally known Notre Dame head football coach Charlie Weis and his wife Maura for their work on behalf of people with developmental disabilities. Through their foundation, Hannah and Friends (established in recognition of their daughter Hannah, who has special needs), the Weises help raise awareness and compassion for people with developmental disabilities and provide grants and other services to individuals and families in their community.
